Standard Operating Guideline- 98-03 Response to Bomb Threats

Purpose: This standard is designed to outline guidelines for emergency response to Bomb Threats.

Scope: All fire department personnel.

- 1. Bomb Threats will be run as a structural response.
- 2. The Officer in Charge will assemble all responding personnel and brief them of the situation as it is known.
- 3. The Officer in Charge in conjunction with the proper Police agency will designate a staging area and will have all apparatus respond to the staging area. Note: The station may be used as a staging area, in which case the Officer in Charge will hold all personnel at the station until further information is obtained.
- 4. Accountability of all personnel will be taken.
- 5. <u>DO NOT transmit on the fire radio</u>, this may activate an explosive device.
- 6. Once on scene, evacuation, if not already decided upon prior to arrival, will be discussed openly between authorities and the management/occupants of the structure.
- 7. Search and rescue will be coordinated between the Officer in Charge and the other authorities on scene.
- 8. All search teams will consist of at least three personnel.
- 9. Discovery of any suspicious package or possible device will be immediately reported to the On-Scene Commander, who will order the evacuation of the structure and its surrounding area.
- 10. Evacuation of search teams will be in the form of whistles or sounding of apparatus horns.
- 11. Should a bomb explode or an incendiary device is detonated, the Officer in Charge should consider that a second explosive device may exist and that any possible evidence should be preserved.

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- 12. Priority of operations will be as follows:
 - a. Rescue of victims. Prior to entering a search area, all search team members will become familiar with a specific search plan, including the overall objective, a designation of the search area, etc. This may require a brief conference among members before entering the search area to develop and communicate the plan. Search activities shall be conducted by teams of no less than 3 people.
 - b. Exposures will be protected. Exposure fires will be confined and extinguished. Exposure structures will be assessed for structural damage and potential collapse. The City/County Inspections department building inspectors may be called upon to assist with assessments.
 - c. Fires in the primary structure will be confined and extinguished.
- 13. In the event of structural collapse, the Incident Commander will contact, as necessary, the following:
 - a. The electric, waters, and gas companies, to shut off the utilities.
 - b. Public Works, Del DOT, and contractors for special equipment such as backhoes, bulldozers, cranes, welding and cutting equipment, etc.
 - c. The City and County building inspectors for structural assessments.
 - d. Mutual aid fire departments for heavy rescues and manpower.
- In the event of mass casualties, alert additional EMS units and the Medical Examiners Office if needed.
- 15. Media relations will be handled by the Police Department's Public Information Officer. A media staging area will be established by the Police Department on the perimeter.
- 16. Consider use of the Red Cross and other organizations for any displaced occupants.
- 17. Also consider use of the Critical Incident Stress Team especially if casualties have been encountered during the incident.
- 18. Once the Fire Department Operations have been completed, the Fire Department Incident Commander will turn the scene over to the Police Department.

19. Ensure all actions are documented.
